

REBELLION RECORD of the

TOWN OF RUSSELL.

RUSSELL, claims to be the BANNER TOWN of the State of New York, and to substantiate that claim, presents the following statement.

She has had in actual service in the field, 31 Commissioned Officers as follows, 1 Col. 1 Lt. Col. 1 Major, '18 Captains 8 first Lieut., and 12 second Lieutenants.

She has furnished 423 Volunteers, as follows. From the commencement of the war, the first of July, 1862. 155. Under the calls of July 2nd. and Aug. 4th. 1862 98. Under the draft of July 1863. 22 responded in person or paid the commutation of \$300. Under calls of Oct. 17th. 1863, Feb. 1st. and March 14th. 1864 71. Under call of July, 18th. 1864, 54. And under call of Dec. 19th. 1864 23.

Of the number, 72 enlisted for one year, 22 for two years, and 329 for three years making in all, 1103 years service.

The following amounts have been raised by subscription, or paid by individuals, aside from all State, County, or Town Taxes.

The valuation of real and personal property in the Town for the year was \$276,000 The entire enrollment list, as completed in the spring of 1860, numbered 318. The population of the Town in 1860, was 2,380. The largest ever polled in the Town was in the fall of 1860, numbering 518. Thus we have furnished to the Government, one-sixth of our entire population tentwelfths of the legal voters, and one hundred and five, more than the entire enrollment list,

In addition to the large Town and County bounties, which has been paid by tax, the inhabitants have paid by subscription, and otherwise, eight per cent of our entire valuation. If any other Town in the State, can show a better record, we shall be pleased to hear from them, and we will cheerfully yield, as they will richly deserve THE BANNER.

Had all the Towns in the State furnished the same proportion of men as RUSSELL, it would have had an army of 675,000 Volunteers. And the same ratio of subscription, would have constituted a fund of \$116,356,385.

SEVENTY-ONE of our brave Boys are now sleeping in Soldiers Graves, which is a good evidence that our Volunteers. were always found at their posts.

The inhabitants of the Town, are now raising the necessary funds, for erecting a Monument to their memory.

After all the Town has done, she was ready to respond to another call had the Government required more men, as an evidence of which, we can state that we had on hand, in cash, a subscription fund of \$850.00. to be used for the encouragement of volunteering, which amount was returned to the subscribers.

I now have the pleasure of presenting you my Report, as Treasurer, of this fund.

The Report, would have been presented before, but from the fact that I could not obtain from Mr. Pierce, the Certificate of Deposit, which I gave him, until last week; and then was obliged to make a journey to Washington, to obtain it. I could not settle with the Bank, and take up the note I gave them until I returned the Certificate of Deposit.

By the delay, I have been able to add more to the Fund, than otherwise could, and it is with pleasure, that I can now announce to the Subscribers, that I have quite a surplus Fund on hand, to be returned to them.

All the expences of recruting, after the failure of Mr. Pierce to obtain the men in Washington, was paid out of the recruting fee, that I received from the County, of \$25.00, for each Volunteer, Recruited in the Town. which fee, was barely sufficient to cover the expences.

There is now charged to the Bounty Fund, for bounties paid Volunteers and expences in procuring certificate of deposit for Mr. Pierce, the sum of, three thousand two hundred and eighty dollars; leaving in my hands the sum of eight hundred and thirty six dollars.

As there will be no further calls on us for Volunteers, this amount will now be returned to the subscribers.

I congratulate the people of Russell, in having so nobly performed their whole duty, through all the years of this cruel war.

You have cheerfully responded to every call with Volunteers, have furnished more men in proportion to your population, have raised more money by subscription, in proportion to your wealth than any other Town in the State.

Russell, has a noble record indeed, and although she has given so freely in the good cause, yet there is one thing more that ought not to be left undone.

We have SEVENTY-ONE brave boys, that now sleep in the SOLDIERS GRAVE. Ought we not to erect in our VILLAGE CEMETERY, a Monument to their memory, on which shall be inscribed the names of those honored ones who have given their lives to their Country; shall it be done? it remains for you to decide.

It has been proposed by quite a number of those most interested, that the ballance of the bounty fund be used for erecting the Monument proposed; with regard to this, each subscriber must decide for himself.

Hoping this may be our last experience in military matters, I remain as ever.
